School Annual Education Report (AER) Cover Letter

Dear Parents and Community Members:

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER), which provides key information on the 2022-23 educational progress for Byron Elementary School. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability, and teacher quality. For the 2023-24 school year, schools were identified based on previous years' performance using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that had at least one underperforming student subgroup in 2022-23. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that had a student subgroup performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state in 2021-22. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance was in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or had a graduation rate at or below 67% in 2021-22. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

Byron Elementary was not assigned any of these labels by the State of Michigan.

Byron Elementary continues to face challenges like many other smaller districts across the county, state and nation. Residual effects pandemic continue to plague students' academic, social and emotional growth. Teacher and staff shortages also threaten student achievement and staff well-being. Our school is focusing on our literacy instructional practices in our work with county experts. Our newest focus is mathematical screening and small group instruction using current data in grades PreK through fifth grade. Our staff is working on ways to combat attendance issues and boost summer learning participation and success. We have staff members pledging additional time to participate in programs through state grants in LETRS and Number Corner training level as well as improving our MTSS/PBIS system throughout our school.

State law requires that we also report additional information.

1. Byron Elementary School services all students in grades K-5, who live within the boundaries of the Byron Area School District. The school also accepts Schools of Choice students from other districts following 105c rules.
2. The Byron School Improvement Team has written a school improvement goal focused on improving the Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) of each student. The team continues to analyze student social-emotional growth data and develop strategic plans for accomplishing this goal throughout the district. The plan is reviewed by the team throughout the school year to monitor progress of implementation. The implementation is in year three of its five year plan.
3. It is the philosophy of the Byron Area Schools and the Shiawassee Regional Education Service District to serve each person with special needs in the least restrictive environment. A continuum of education placement options is offered from age 0-26, which provides for mild to severe handicapping conditions, supportive services, and vocational training programs designed to meet the needs of a special needs person. The placement options are provided through cooperative planning by the Byron Area Schools, Shiawassee Regional Education Service District and the Michigan Department of Education, since no district could support a full continuum itself. The Shiawassee Regional Education Service District operates programs and services for the low incidence populations. Likewise, primary impaired programs are center programs and service clusters of districts. For the high incidence of EMI, EI, and LD, each individual district offers those options that best meet their needs. However, by agreement, each district can have placement access to categorical programs operated by another district, if appropriate. In this way, a full continuum is available in an efficient and cost-effective manner regardless of district size. Byron does have students

who attend programs within the Shiawassee Regional Education Service District.

4. Curriculum units at Byron Elementary School are aligned with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) and the Michigan Grade Level Content Expectations (GLCE). Assessment of the core curriculum, as well as all other curricular areas, is an ongoing process.
5. Our school uses the Acadience screening assessment three times per academic year to monitor student's literacy and mathematical progress. We also conduct regular benchmark assessments using NWEA MAP, testing students in Kindergarten through 5th grade in the areas of math and reading three times a year. Students in grades 3rd through 5th also participate in the state M-STEP assessment in the spring.
6. During our annual parent-teacher conferences, held in October 2023, we had a parent participation rate of 88%. In October 2022, our participation rate was 87%.

The staff at Byron Elementary continue to provide a solid education to all of our students. Our commitment to work relentlessly to prepare every single student to become a productive member of society does not waiver despite the immense challenges. We are proud of our partnership with our families and our community. We are proud to be Eagles!
